Fund Manager's Report

for the year ended 31 December 2017

The Fund Manager presents its report on the affairs of Zenith Income Fund ("the Fund") together with the auditor's report and the financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2017.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

The Fund is an open-ended unit trust scheme established in September 2008 that invests predominantly in money market assets, fixed income securities and equities.

The Fund has been designed to suit the needs of individuals, institutional investors, employee schemes, trust companies, insurance companies, government parastatals, investment clubs and other associations seeking to achieve stable capital appreciation in Nigerian based investments. It invests primarily in fixed income securities and money market instruments which are issued by companies, governments, government agencies, supranational and equities from time to time.

Proposed distribution

In line with the provisions of the Trust Deed, the Fund Manager has recommended a distribution of 70 kobo per unit holding for the year ended 31 December 2017 (31 December 2016: 33k). However, the distribution has not been effected as at 31 December 2017. Furthermore, the distribution of 33 kobo per unit holding for the year ended 31 December 2016 were effected during the year.

Summary of Fund performance over the period

The Fund's net asset value per unit appreciated by 16.36% over the one year period ended 31 December 2017 above its hurdle rate of 10%. The Fund's performance over the twelve month period improved due to rising yields in the money market.

REVIEW OF THE INVESTMENT ENVIRONMENT - 2017

In 2017, the Nigerian economy returned to growth after enduring four quarters of contraction. The recovery was on the back of rising crude oil prices in the international market and the cessation of attacks on Oil installations by militants in the Niger Delta area. The momentum created by the rebound in the oil sector soon snow balled into other sectors of the economy through the exchange rate channel. Major macroeconomic variables like Inflation, GDP growth rate, External reserves and Balance of trade started to show signs of improvement. Reforms in the FX market upturned the negative sentiments that characterised the business landscape, strengthening consumer and investor confidence, and resulting in increased appetite for Nigerian assets by foreign investors. The climax of events on the economic front however, was when Nigeria finally exited recession in the second quarter of 2017.

In this environment, pessimism soon gave way to optimism fuelling a bullish run in the equities market that lasted till the end of the year. The Nigeria Stock Exchange All Share Index (NSE ASI) appreciated by 42.3% year-on-year to close in the positive territory for the first time since 2013. The index gained 11,368.57 points, (the equivalent of N4.36 trillion in market capitalisation) to end the year at 38,243.19 points.

The Index started 2017 on a losing note, down 5.05% by the end of the first quarter. In the second quarter, stocks held up relatively well pushing the benchmark 29.79% higher. The positive trend continued as the NSE ASI gained in the third and fourth quarters by 7.01% and 9.83% respectively.

Fund Manager's report Cont'd

During the period under review, money market rates continued their upward trajectory across maturities reflecting efforts by the Central Bank of Nigeria (CBN) to attract more foreign portfolio inflows. The average Treasury bills yield on 91-day, 182-day and 364-day benchmarks settled at 17.3%, 18.7% and 20.3% respectively in 2017 against 12.5%, 14.3% and 15.0% in that order recorded in 2016.

Review of Fund Strategy and Performance

On the back of improving macroeconomic conditions in Nigeria, we continued to focus on enhancing the diversification of the Fund across style and sectors in an effort to remain balanced. Broad positioning was skewed largely to take advantage of rising yields in the fixed income market. We will continue to buy and add to our portfolio companies with good fundamentals, strong balance sheets, free cash flow and experienced management teams.

MARKET OUTLOOK FOR 2018

Equities

Going into 2018, we expect macroeconomic conditions will continue to strengthen. Higher global oil prices, increased domestic crude oil production and greater stability in Nigeria's FX market will continue to buoy stock prices forward. Despite the bull run in 2017, the average trailing multiples for the Nigerian equities market is still lower than that of the MSCI Frontier market index. We will continue to maintain our long-term discipline as several stocks still offer considerable long-term value and we will be seeking to acquire such stocks at the right price.

Fixed income securities

In 2018, in view of government's plan to refinance its domestic debt from proceeds of its US\$3 billion Eurobond issuance programme which kicked off in November last year. We expect yields for short tenure instruments to moderate in the short end of the curve. Monetary authorities will however, try to find an equilibrium interest rate that continue attract foreign inflows on one hand and encourages economic growth on the other.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Unit holders of Zenith Income Fund

Report on the Audit of the Financial Statements

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Zenith Income Fund (the Fund), which comprise the statements of financial position as at 31 December, 2017, and the statements of profit or loss and other comprehensive income, statements of changes in equity and statements of cash flows for the year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information, as set out on pages 12 to 36.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements give a true and fair view of the financial position of the Fund as at 31 December, 2017, and of its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRSs) and in the manner required by the Financial Reporting Council of Nigeria Act, 2011.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (ISAs). Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are independent of the Fund in accordance with the International Ethics Standards Board for Accountants' Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants (IESBA Code) together with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements in Nigeria and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements and the IESBA Code. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Key Audit Matters

Key audit matters are those matters that, in our professional judgment, were of most significance in our audit of the financial statements of the current period. These matters were addressed in the context of our audit of the financial statements as a whole, and in forming our opinion thereon, and we do not provide a separate opinion on these matters.

Financial assets at fair value through profit or loss

The assets of the Fund consists primarily of financial assets at fair value through profit or loss, which comprise quoted equities and debt instruments. These assets represent a significant proportion of the Fund's total assets. The changes in fair value of these financial assets have a significant impact on the Fund's financial position and the financial performance for the year. We have therefore identified the valuation of of these financial assets as a key audit matter.



How the matter was addressed in our audit

Our procedures included amongst others the following;

- We evaluated the design, implementation and operating effectiveness of key controls over the determination and recording of the fair value of the investments in quoted equities and debt instruments;
- We compared the fair values used by management to externally observable market place data; and
- We re-computed the fair value of the investments in quoted equity & debt securities by using the verified market price and compared our calculations to the amount recorded by the Fund.

The Fund's accounting policy on financial assets at fair value through profit or loss and related disclosure and risks are shown in notes 3c, 3f, 5b and 14 respectively.

Other Information

The Board of Directors of the Fund Manager are responsible for the other information which comprise the Fund Manager's report, Statement of Fund Manager's responsibility, Certification of accounts by Directors of the Fund Manager and Other national disclosures, while the Fund's Trustees is responsible for the Trustees' report and Statement of Trustees' responsibilities but does not include the financial statements and our audit report thereon.

Our opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information and we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

In connection with our audit of the financial statements, our responsibility is to read the other information and in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial statements or our knowledge obtained in the audit or otherwise appears to be materially misstated. If, based on the work we have performed, we conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, we are required to report that fact. We have nothing to report in this regard.

Responsibilities of the Directors of the Fund Manager for the Financial Statements

The Directors of the Fund Manager are responsible for the preparation of financial statements that give a true and fair view in accordance with IFRSs and in the manner required by the Financial Reporting Council of Nigeria Act, 2011, and for such internal control as the Directors of the Fund Manager determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, the Directors of the Fund Manager are responsible for assessing the Fund's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the Directors of the Fund Manager either intends to liquidate the Fund or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with ISAs will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

We describe these matters in our auditor's report unless law or regulation precludes public disclosure about the matter or when, in extremely rare circumstances, we determine that a matter should not be communicated in our report because the adverse consequences of doing so would reasonably be expected to outweigh the public interest benefits of such communication.

1 Reporting entity

Zenith Income Fund ("the Fund") is an open-ended unit trust scheme that operates in Nigeria. The address of the Fund's registered office is Zenith Heights, Plot 87 Ajose Adeogun Street, Victoria Island Lagos. The Fund invests predominantly in equities and in money market assets. The Fund is not a legal entity but is constituted and exists under the Trust Deed. Units of the Fund were first allotted to subscribers on 10 September, 2008.

In line with the directives of the Securities and Exchange Commission that capital market operators should not have multiple licenses to operate within the market, the fund/portfolio Manager license formerly registered with Zenith Capital Limited was transferred to Zenith Assets Management Limited in September 2013.

The underlying objective of the Fund is to achieve superior return in the medium to long term through exposure to a selected portfolio of equities and fixed income securities.

2 (a) Statement of compliance

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the International Financial Reporting Standards as issued by the International Accounting Standards Board ("IASB")

The financial statements also comply with the Financial Reporting Council of Nigeria Act, 2011.

The financial statements were authorized for issue by the Directors of the Fund Manager on 29 March 2018.

(b) Basis of measurement

These financial statements are prepared on the historical cost basis except for financial instruments at fair value through profit or loss, which are measured at fair value.

(c) Functional and presentation currency

The financial statements are presented in Naira, which is the Fund's functional currency. All financial information presented in Naira has been rounded to the nearest thousand unless otherwise indicated.

(d) Use of estimates and judgments

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with the International Financial Reporting Standards requires management to make judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of accounting policies and the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, income and expenses. Actual result may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revision to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimates are revised and in any future periods affected.

Information about significant areas of estimation uncertainties and critical judgments in applying accounting policies that have the most significant effect on the amounts recognised in the financial statements are described in Note 5 of the financial statements.

3 Significant accounting policies

The accounting policies set out below have been consistently applied to all periods presented in these financial statements.

(a) Interest income

Interest income and expenses, including income from non-derivative financial assets at fair value profit or loss, are recognised in the statement of profit or loss, using effective interest method.

For the year ended 31 December 2017

The effective interest rate is the rate that exactly discounts the estimated future cash payments and receipts through the expected life of the financial instruments (or, when appropriate, a shorter period) to the carrying amount of the financial instruments. When calculating the effective interest rate, the Fund estimates future cash flows considering all contractual terms of the financial instruments, but not future credit losses. Interest received or receivable and interest paid or payable are recognised in the statement of profit or loss as interest income and interest expense, respectively.

(b) Dividend income

Dividend income is recognised in the statement of profit or loss on the date that the right to receive payment is established. For quoted equity securities this is usually the ex-dividend date. For unquoted equity securities this is usually the date when the shareholders have approved the payment of a dividend. Dividend income from equity securities designated as at fair value through profit or loss is recognised in the statement of profit or loss as a separate line item.

(c) Net gain from financial instruments at fair value through profit and loss

Net gain from financial instruments at fair value through profit or loss includes all realised and unrealised fair value changes, but excludes interest and dividend income.

The realised gain from financial instruments at fair value through profit or loss is computed as the difference between the carrying amount of a financial instrument at the beginning of the reporting period, or the transaction price if it was purchased in the current reporting period, and its sale or settlement price while the unrealised gain is calculated as the difference between the carrying amount of a financial instrument at the beginning of the period, or the transaction price if it was purchased in the current reporting period, and its fair value at the end of the period.

(d) Fees and commission expenses

(i) Management fees

Management fees are charged at a rate not exceeding 5% of the Net Asset Value of the Fund. They are accrued daily, but paid quarterly in arrears, based on portfolio valuation.

(ii) Incentive fees

An annual incentive fee is calculated as 30% of total returns in excess of 10% of the Net Asset Value of the Fund and is accounted for on an accrual basis or as soon as this condition is met.

The total expenses charged to the Fund, excluding incentive fees, are not to exceed 5% of the Net Asset Value of the Fund.

(iii) Other expenses

Other expenses comprising trustees fees, custodian fees, registrar fees, and auditors fees are recognized as the related services are rendered, in accordance with the substance of the Trust Deed and relevant agreements. All other expenses are recognised in the statement of profit or loss on an accrual basis.

(e) Tax

Under the current system of taxation in Nigeria, the Fund is exempted from paying taxes on income, profit and capital gain. Dividend income and certain interest income received by the Fund is however subject to withholding tax. Such income is therefore recognised gross of tax with the corresponding withholding tax recognised as tax expense. The withholding tax borne on dividend and interest income is treated as final tax.

For the year ended 31 December 2017

(f) Financial assets and financial liabilities

(i) (a) Initial recognition and measurement

Financial instruments at fair value through profit or loss are recognised at fair value with transaction costs, which are directly attributable to the acquisition or issue of the financial instruments, being recognised immediately through the statement of profit or loss. Financial instruments that are not carried at fair value through profit or loss are initially measured at fair value plus transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition or issue of the financial instruments.

Financial instruments are recognised or de-recognised on the date the Company commits to purchase or sell the instruments (trade day accounting).

(b) Subsequent measurement

Subsequent to initial measurement, financial instruments are measured either at fair value or amortised cost, depending on their classification.

(ii) Classification

The Fund classifies financial assets and financial liabilities into the following categories:

Financial assets at fair value through profit or loss:

Designated at fair value through profit or loss - investment in debt securities and equity investments.

Financial assets at amortised cost:

Loans and receivables - cash and cash equivalents.

Financial liabilities at amortised cost:

Accounts payable.

The Fund has designated certain financial assets as at fair value through profit and loss when the assets are managed, evaluated and reported internally on a fair value basis and the designation eliminates or significantly reduces an accounting mismatch that would otherwise arise.

A non-derivative financial asset with fixed or determinable payment may be classified as loan and receivables unless it is quoted in an active market, or it is an asset for which the holder may not recover substantially all of its initial, investment, other than because of credit deterioration.

Note 6 provides a reconciliation of the items in the statement of financial position to the categories of financial instruments, as defined by IAS 39.

(iii) Amortized cost measurement

The amortized cost of a financial asset or liability is the amount at which the financial asset or liability is measured at initial recognition, minus principal repayments, plus or minus the cumulative amortization using the effective interest method of any difference between the initial amount recognised and the maturity amount, minus any reduction for impairment.

(iv) Fair value measurement

'Fair value' is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date in the principal or, in its absence, the most advantageous market to which the Fund has access at that date. The fair value of a liability reflects its non-performance risk.

When available, the Fund measures the fair value of an instrument using the quoted price in an active market for that instrument. A market is regarded as 'active' if transactions for the asset or liability take place with sufficient frequency and volume to provide pricing information on an ongoing basis. The Fund measures instruments quoted in an active market at a mid price.

For the year ended 31 December 2017

If there is no quoted price in an active market, then the Fund uses valuation techniques that maximise the use of relevant observable inputs and minimise the use of unobservable inputs. The chosen valuation technique incorporates all of the factors that market participants would take into account in pricing a transaction.

The Fund recognises transfers between levels of the fair value hierarchy as at the end of the reporting period during which the change has occurred.

(v) Impairment

A financial asset not classified at fair value through profit or loss is assessed at each reporting date to determine whether there is objective evidence of impairment. A financial asset or a group of financial assets is 'impaired' if there is objective evidence of impairment as a result of one or more events that occurred after the initial recognition of the asset(s) and that loss event(s) had an impact on the estimated future cash flows of that asset(s) that can be estimated reliably.

Objective evidence that financial assets are impaired includes significant financial difficulty of the borrower or issuer, default or delinquency by a borrower, restructuring of the amount due on terms that the Fund would not otherwise consider, indications that a borrower or issuer will enter bankruptcy, or adverse changes in the payment status of the borrowers.

An impairment loss in respect of a financial asset measured at amortised cost is calculated as the difference between its carrying amount and the present value of the estimated future cash flows discounted at the asset's original effective interest rate. Losses are recognised in the statement of profit or loss and reflected in an allowance account against receivables. Interest on the impaired asset continues to be recognised. If an event occurring after the impairment was recognised causes the amount of impairment loss to decrease, then the decrease in impairment loss is reversed through the statement of profit or loss.

(vi) Derecognition

The Fund derecognizes a financial asset when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the asset expire, or it transfers the rights to receive the contractual cash flows in a transaction in which substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of the financial asset are transferred, or in which the Fund neither transfers nor retains substantially all the risk and rewards of ownership and does not retain control of the financial asset.

On derecognition of a financial asset, the difference between the carrying amount of the asset (or the carrying amount allocated to the portion of the asset derecognised), and consideration received (including any new asset obtained less any new liability assumed) is recognised in the statement of profit or loss.

Any interest in such transferred financial assets that is created or retained by the Fund is recognised as a separate asset or liability.

The Fund enters into transactions whereby it transfers assets recognised on its statement of financial position, but retains either all or substantially all of the risks and rewards of the transferred assets or a portion of them. If all or substantially all risks and rewards are retained, then the transferred assets are not derecognized. Transfer of assets with retention of all or substantially all risks and rewards include securities lending and repurchase transactions.

The Fund derecognises a financial liability when its contractual obligations are discharged, cancelled or expired.

For the year ended 31 December 2017

(vii) Offsetting

Financial assets and liabilities are offset and the net amount presented in the statement of financial position when, and only when, the Fund has a legal right to offset the amounts and intends either to settle on a net basis or to realize the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

Income and expenses are presented on a net basis only when permitted under IFRSs, e.g. for gains and losses from financial instruments at fair value through profit or loss.

(g) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise deposits with banks and highly liquid financial assets with original maturities of less than three months or less from the acquisition date that are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in their fair value and are used by the Fund in the management of short-term commitments.

(h) Capital

(i) Equity attributable to unit holders

The Fund classifies financial instrument issued as financial liabilities or equity instrument in accordance with the substance of the contractual terms of the instrument.

The Fund units in issue are financial instruments issued by the Fund and, or on liquidation of the Fund the unitholders are entitled to the residual net asset. They rank pari passu in all material respect and have identical terms and conditions. The units provide the investors with the right to require redemption for cash at a value proportionate to the investor share in the Fund's net asset at each daily redemption date and also in the event of the Fund's liquidation.

A puttable financial instrument that includes a contractual obligation for the Fund to repurchase or redeem that instrument for cash or another financial asset is classified as equity if it meets all of the following conditions:

- It entitles the holder to a pro rata share of the Fund's net asset in the event of the Fund's liquidation
- · It is in the class of instruments that is subordinate to all other classes of assets of instruments
- All financial instruments in the class of instruments that is subordinate to all other classes of instruments have identical features
- Apart from the contractual obligation for the Fund to repurchase or redeem the instrument for each or another financial asset, the instrument does not include any other features that would require classification as a
- The total expected cash flows attributable to the instruments over its life are based substantially on the profit
 or loss, the change in the recognised net assets or the change in the fair value of the recognised and
 unrecognised net assets of the Fund over the life of the instrument

The Fund's unit meet this conditions and are classified as equity.

Incremental costs directly attributable to the issue or redemption of units are recognised directly in equity as a deduction from the proceeds or part of the acquisition cost.

(ii) Repurchase of units

When units recognised as equity are redeemed, the par value of the units is presented as a deduction from the unit holders equity. Any premium or discount to par value is recognised as an adjustment to retained earnings.

For the year ended 31 December 2017

(i) Contingent liabilities

A contingent liability is a possible obligation that arises from past events and whose existence will be confirmed only by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events not wholly within the control of the Fund or the Fund has a present obligation as a result of past events which is not recognised because it is not probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation; or the amount cannot be reliably estimated. Contingent liabilities are disclosed in the financial statements.

(j) New standards and interpretations not yet adopted

A number of new standards, amendments to standards and interpretations are not yet applicable for the year ended 31 December 2017, and have not been applied in preparing these financial statements. None of these standards is expected to have a significant effect on the financial statements, except for the following:

(i) Financial Instruments (IFRS 9)

On 24 July 2014, the IASB issued the final IFRS 9 Financial Instruments Standard, which replaces earlier versions of IFRS 9 and completes the IASB's project to replace IAS 39 Financial Instruments: Recognition and Measurement. This standard is not likely to have a significant impact on the Fund given the nature of the Fund's operations, which will include changes in the measurement bases of the Fund's financial assets to amortised cost, fair value through other comprehensive income or fair value through profit or loss. Even though these measurement categories are similar to IAS 39, the criteria for classification into these categories are significantly different. In addition, the IFRS 9 impairment model has been changed from an "incurred loss" model of IAS 39 to an "expected credit loss" model, which is expected to increase the provision for bad debts recognised by the Company.

The amendments apply retrospectively. The Fund will adopt the amendments for the year ending 31 December 2018. The Fund manager is currently in the process of evaluating the potential effect of this standard. Given the nature of the Fund's operation, this standard is not likely to have a significant impact on the Fund's financial statements.

(ii) Revenue from contracts with customers (IFRS 15)

This standard replaces IAS 11 Construction Contracts, IAS 18 Revenue, IFRIC 13 Customer Loyalty Programmes, IFRIC 15 Agreements for the Construction of Real Estate, IFRIC 18 Transfer of Assets from Customers and SIC-31 Revenue – Barter of Transactions Involving Advertising Services.

The standard contains a single model that applies to contracts with customers and two approaches to recognising revenue: at a point in time or over time. The model features a contract-based five-step analysis of transactions to determine whether, how much and when revenue is recognised.

The Fund manager is currently in the process of assessing the impact of this standard on the Fund's financial statements.

IFRS 15 is effective for annual reporting periods begininning on or after 1 January 2018, with early adoption permitted.

(iii) Leases (IFRS 16)

IFRS 16 was published in January 2016. It sets out the principles for the recognition, measurement, presentation and disclosure of leases for both parties to a contract, i.e. the customer ('lessee') and the supplier ('lessor'). IFRS 16 replaces the previous leases Standard, IAS 17 Leases, and related Interpretations. IFRS 16 includes a single model for lessees which will result in almost all leases being included in the Statement of Financial Position. No significant changes have been included for lessors. IFRS 16 also includes extensive new disclosure requirements for both lessees and lessors. The standard is effective for annual periods beginning on or after 1 January 2019, with early adoption permitted only if the entity also adopts IFRS 15.

The Fund manager is currently in the process of evaluating the potential effect of this standard.

Early Adoption of Standards

The Fund did not early adopt new or amended standards in 2017.

4 Financial risk management

(a) Introduction and overview

The Fund has exposure to the following risks from financial instruments:

- Credit risk
- · Liquidity risk
- Market risk
- Operational risk

This note presents information about the Fund's exposure to each of the above risks, the Fund's objectives, policies and processes for measuring and managing risk, and the Fund's management of capital.

(i) Risk Management framework

The Fund maintains position in a variety of non-derivative financial instruments in accordance with its investment management strategy. A maximum of 5% of the Fund shall be invested in cash and cash equivalents, 35% in equities and a range between 65% to 100% in fixed income securities under normal market conditions. The Fund's investment portfolio comprises listed equity and fixed income securities.

The Fund's investment manager has been given a discretionary authority to manage the assets in line with the Fund's investment objectives. Compliance with the target asset allocations and the composition of the portfolio is monitored by the investment committee on a quarterly basis.

In instances where the portfolio has diverged from target asset allocations, the Fund's investment manager is obliged to take action to rebalance the portfolio in line with the established targets, within prescribed time limits.

(b) Credit risk

Credit risk is defined as the likelihood that a customer or counterparty is unable to meet the contracted financial obligation or commitment that it has entered into with the Fund, resulting in a financial loss to the Fund. It arises principally from debt securities held and cash and cash equivalents.

(i) Management of the credit risk

The Fund's policy over credit risk is to minimise its exposure to counterparties with perceived higher risk of default by dealing only with counterparties meeting the Fund's credit standards.

Credit risk is monitored on a periodic basis by the Fund Manager in accordance with policies and procedures in place. Where the credit risk is not in accordance with the investment policy or guidelines of the Fund, the Fund manager is obliged to rebalance the portfolio in compliance with the stated investment parameter.

(ii) Investment in debt securities

The Fund's maximum credit risk exposure (without taking into account collateral and other credit enhancements) at the reporting date is represented by the respective carrying amounts of the relevant financial assets in the statement of financial position.

As at 31 December 2017, the Fund's investment in debt securities was N824 million (31 December 2016: N748.5 million).

(iii) Cash and cash equivalents

The Fund held cash and cash equivalents of N11,472,869 as at 31 December 2017 (31 December 2016: N655,608). The cash and cash equivalents are held with Citibank Nigeria Limited. The Fund Managers monitors the financial position of Citibank on a quarterly basis.

(vi) Concentration risk

There were no significant concentrations in this portfolio to any individual issuer or group of issuers in the identified industry as at 31 December 2017 (31 December 2016; Nil). The concentration of the investment portfolio of the Fund by sector is disclosed in Note 15.

(vii) Settlement risk

The Fund's activities may give rise to risk at the time of settlement of transactions and trades. Settlement risk is the risk of loss due to the failure of an entity to honour its obligations to deliver cash, securities or other assets as contractually agreed.

(c) Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Fund will encounter difficulty in meeting the obligations associated with its financial liabilities that are settled by delivering eash or another financial asset.

(i) Management of liquidity risk

The Trust Deed and the Fund manager's approach to managing liquidity is to ensure, as far as possible, that it will always have sufficient liquidity to meet its liabilities when due, under both normal and stress conditions, including estimated redemptions of units, without incurring unacceptable losses or risking damage to the Fund's reputation. The Fund is exposed to liquidity risk because of the need to meet unitholder's redemption of units at any date.

As part of its management of liquidity risk, the Fund has primarily invested in securities which are considered to be readily realisable as they are actively traded and can easily meet the Fund's liquidity requirements.

The Fund's overall liquidity risk is monitored on a periodic basis by the Fund Manager.

(ii) Residual contractual maturities of financial assets

The table below shows the undiscounted eash flows on the Fund's financial assets and liabilities on the basis of their earliest possible contractual maturity. The gross amount for financial assets and liabilities include coupon receivables and interest payable respectively when appropriate.

As part of the Fund's management of liquidity risk arising from redemption of units by unit holders, the Fund holds liquid assets comprising of cash and cash equivalents and treasury bills issued by Federal Government of Nigeria which can easily meet the Fund's liquidity requirements.

(d) Market risk

Market risk is the risk that changes in market prices, such as interest rates, equity prices, foreign exchange rates and credit spreads (not relating to changes in the obligor's/issuer's credit standing) will affect the Fund's income or the fair value of its holding of financial instruments. The objective of market risk management is to manage and control market risk exposures within acceptable parameters, while optimising the return.

(i) Management of the market risk

The Fund's strategy for the management of market risk is driven by the Fund's investment objective. The Fund's investment objectives, policies and processes are aimed at instituting a model that objectively identifies, measures and manages market risks in the Fund. The Fund's market position are monitored on a periodic basis by the investment committee. An overview of the Fund's investment portfolio as at 31 December 2017 is as shown in Note 15.

(ii) Interest rate risk

The Fund is exposed to the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of its financial instruments will fluctuate as a result of changes in market interest rates. In respect of the Fund's interest-bearing financial instruments the Fund's policy is to transact in financial instruments that mature or reprise in the short term, i.e. no longer than 12 months. Accordingly, the Fund would be subject to limited exposure to fair value or cash flow interest rate risk due to fluctuations in the prevailing levels of market interest rates.

(iii) Foreign Exchange risk

Foreign Exchange risk is the exposure of the Fund's financial condition to adverse movements in exchange rates. The Fund is exposed to risk that the exchange rate of its currency relative to other foreign currencies may change in a manner that has an adverse effect on the fair value or future cash flows of that portion of the Fund's financial assets and liabilities denominated in currencies other than the Naira.

Currently the Fund does not have transactions in any other currency except the Fund's functional currency i.e Naira. Hence it is not exposed to foreign exchange risk.

(iv) Other market price risk

Other market price risk is the risk that the fair value of the financial instruments will fluctuate as a result of changes in market prices (other than arising from interest rate risk or currency risk), whether caused by factors specific to an individual investment, it's issuer or factors affecting all instruments traded in the market. Note 15 sets out concentration of the investment assets held by the Fund as at the reporting date.

The table below shows the impact of likely movement in market prices of financial instruments at fair value through profit or loss on the statement of profit or loss if prices increase or decrease by 100 basis points as at 31 December 2017.

(c) Operational risk

Operational risk is the risk of direct and indirect loss arising from a wide variety of causes associated with the process, technology and infrastructure supporting the Fund's activities with financial instruments either internally within the Fund or externally at the Fund's service providers, and from external factors other than credit, market and liquidity risks such as those arising from legal and regulatory requirements and generally accepted standards of investments management behaviour.

The Fund's objective is to manage operational risk so as to balance limiting of financial losses and damage to its reputation with achieving its investment objective of generating returns to investors.

The primary responsibility for the development and implementation of controls over operational risk rests with the Fund Manager. This responsibility is supported by the development of overall standards for the management of operational risk, which encompasses the controls and processes at the service providers and the establishment of service levels with the service providers, in the following areas:

- requirement for appropriate segregation of duties between various functions, roles and responsibilities;
- · requirement for the reconciliation and monitoring of transactions;
- compliance with regulatory and other legal requirements;
- documentation of controls and procedures;
- requirement for the periodic assessment of operational risk faced, and the adequacy of controls and procedures to address the risks identified;
- · contingency plans;
- · ethical and business standards; and
- · risk mitigation, including insurance if this is effective.

Substantially all of the assets of the Fund are held by Citibank Nigeria Limited. Bankruptcy or insolvency of the Fund's custodian may cause the Fund's rights with respect to the securities held by the custodian to be delayed or limited. The Fund Manager monitors credit ratings and capital adequacy of its custodian on a periodic basis.

The Fund has provided the custodian a general lien over the financial assets held in custody for the purpose of covering the exposure from providing custody services. The general lien is part of the standard contractual terms of the custody agreement.

There was no significant operational risk incidence during the financial year.

(f) Capital management

The units issued by the Fund provide an investor with the right to require redemption for cash at a value proportionate to the investor's share in the Fund's net assets at the redemption date and are classified as equity. The Fund's objectives in managing the units are to ensure a stable base to maximise returns to all investors, and to manage liquidity arising from redemptions. The total unit holders funds as at 31 December 2017 was N857,737,000 (2016; N745,327,000).

5 Use of estimates and judgments

These disclosures supplement the commentary on financial risk management (see note 4).

(a) Key sources of estimation uncertainty

(i) Determining fair value

The determination of fair value for financial assets and liabilities for which there is no observable market prices requires the use of valuation techniques as described in note 3(f)(iv). For financial instruments that trade infrequently and have little price transparency, fair value is less objective, and requires varying degrees of judgment depending on liquidity, concentration, uncertainty of market factors, pricing assumptions and other risks affecting the specific instrument.

(b) Critical accounting judgments in applying the Fund's accounting policies

(i) Financial asset and liability classification

The Fund's accounting policies guide the scope for assets and liabilities to be designated on inception in to different accounting categories in certain circumstances.

- (i) In designating financial assets at fair value through profit or loss, the Fund has determined that it has met one of the criteria for this
 designation set out in note 3(f)(ii)
- (ii) The unitholders interest in the Fund is classified as equity, as the Fund has determined that it has met the criteria for this designation set out in note 3(h)(i).

Details of the Fund's classification of financial assets and liabilities are given in note 6.

(ii) Valuation of financial instruments

The Fund's accounting policy on fair value measurement is discussed in note 3(f)(iv)

The Fund measures fair value using the following fair value hierarchy that reflects the significance of the inputs used in making the measurements:

- Level 1: Inputs that are quoted market prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical instruments.
- (ii) Level 2: Inputs other than quoted prices included within Level 1 that are observable either directly (i.e. as prices) or indirectly (i.e. derived from prices). This category includes instruments valued using: quoted market prices in active markets for similar instruments; quoted prices for identical or similar instruments in markets that are considered less than active; or other valuation techniques in which all significant inputs are directly or indirectly observable from market data.
- (iii) Level 3: Inputs that are unobservable. This category includes all instruments for which the valuation technique includes inputs not based on observable data and the unobservable inputs have a significant effect on the instrument's valuation. This category includes instruments that are valued based on quoted prices for similar instruments but for which significant unobservable adjustments or assumptions are required to reflect differences between the instruments.

Fair values of financial assets and financial liabilities that are traded in active markets are based on quoted prices or dealer price quotations. For all other financial instruments the Fund determines fair values using valuation techniques. Valuation techniques include net present value and discounted cash flow models, comparison to similar instruments for which market observable prices exist and other valuation models. Assumptions and inputs used in valuation techniques include risk-free and benchmark interest rates, credit spreads and other premia used in estimating discount rates, bonds and equity prices, foreign currency exchange rates, equity and equity index prices volatilities and correlations. The objective of valuation techniques is to arrive at a fair value determination that reflects the price of the financial instruments at the reporting date that would have been determined by market participants acting at arm's length.

Availability of observable market prices and model inputs reduces the need for management judgment and estimation and also reduces the uncertainty associated with determination of fair value. Availability of observable market prices and inputs varies depending on the product and market and is prone to changes based on specific events and general conditions in the financial markets.

(i) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents represent bank balances and short term deposit with varying periods of between one day and three months depending on the immediate requirements of the Company. The fair value of these balances is their carrying amounts.

(ii) Investment securities

Investment securities consist of treasury bills, commercial papers and quoted equities. Treasury bills represent short term instruments issued by the Central Bank of Nigeria. The fair value of treasury bills are determined with reference to quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets. The estimated fair value of treasury bills at amortized cost represents the discounted amount of estimated future cash flows expected to be received. Expected cashflows are discounted at current market rates to determine fair value.

The fair values of quoted equity securities are determined by reference to quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical instruments. Commercial papers represents balances with local banks. The fair value of commercial papers are their carrying amount.
