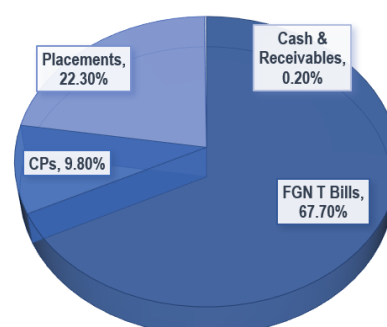
Review and Outlook

- Yields on treasury bills dropped by 74bps on average over the month from 15.26% in December 2018 to 14.52% in January. The decrease was more pronounced in the 1M and 3M yields which fell by 2.86% and 2.02% respectively. 7—18 day Commercial Papers yielded 13.54% on 31 Jan, vs. 12.46% yield on T-Bills with similar maturities on the same day.
- The January 2018 position represents the first pull back in T-Bill yields after 5 consecutive months of increase from an average of 11.96% in July. The Monetary Policy Committee in its January 2019 meeting held the policy rate unchanged at 14%, noting the improved performance of the economy and the moderation in inflation rate. We think yields could rise further from current levels largely on the back of rising USD yields and the desire to keep NGN assets competitive to strengthen the naira.

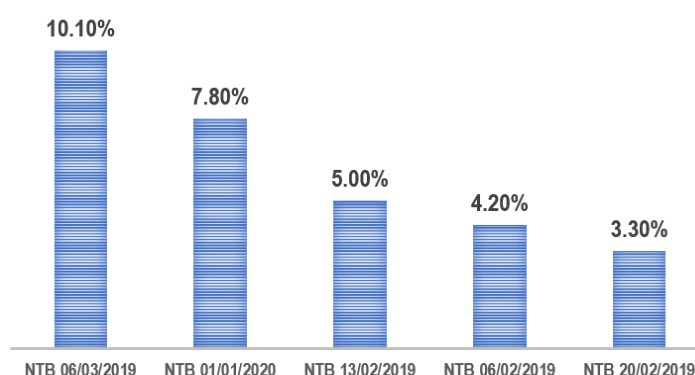

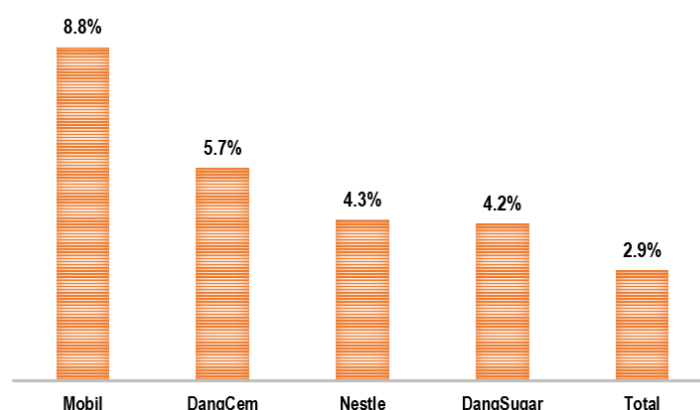

Review and Outlook

- Yields on treasury bills dropped by 74bps on average over the month from 15.26% in December 2018 to 14.52% in January while yields on FGN bonds declined by 19bps on average to 15.01% in January 2019 from 15.2% in December 2018. Corporate Bonds yielded 17.03% on 31 Jan, vs. 15.27% yield on FGN Bonds with similar maturities on the same day.
- The January 2018 position represents the first pull back in T-Bill yields after 5 consecutive months of increase from an average of 11.96% in July. The Monetary Policy Committee in its January 2019 meeting held the policy rate unchanged at 14%, noting the improved performance of the economy and the moderation in inflation rate. We think yields could rise further from current levels largely on the back of rising USD yields and the desire to keep NGN assets competitive to strengthen the naira.
